

"Tree Beautification"

The Tree Beautification process was a success! Although not everybody qualified to receive a tree, we were still able to add about 30 into our neighborhoods landscape. A major thank you needs to go to Jim Ortiz over at the City of Costa Mesa who coordinated the tree planting and informed us Mesa Verde residents, of what we can do to take care of our new green additions. Here are a couple of tips for the care of our trees:

- 1. Keep new trees well watered throughout this hot and dry season.
- 2. Fill the tree well with water. Let the water drain and then refill the tree well again. You will be watering less during the winter time.
- 3. The watering of the tree for the first six (6) months is crucial for the establishment of the trees.
- 4. Do not prune or remove your own tree. (Call the city to have them come take a look at your tree.) You do not want to incur any costs due to gas/water pipe breakages.
- 5. If you notice a difference in the newly planted tree (yellow leaves, no leaves on branches, etc). Please contact the City and the City will evaluate the tree.
- 6. If tree stakes or tree ties are damaged or vandalized. Please contact the City and the City will replace.

We have taken a break as of November 1st 2016 on taking tree requests but will be back open for business starting March 1, 2017. We greatly appreciate everybody who had a tree or trees planted and look forward to hearing requests and continuing to beautify Mesa Verde.

"Waterproofing in Expansive Soil"

Many of us here in Mesa Verde are aware of our clay soil issues. In order to maintain and protect our homes we have found a couple of articles in hopes to inform on the steps to protect against foundation harm. One of our neighbors here in M.V. has used these methods and has found that it has helped tremendously to fight the clay soil battle. Here are a few things that these articles suggest to protect the foundation of your home.

- Use drip irrigation to water trees and plants, thus minimizing the amount of water that is soaked into the soil. It's also a good idea to avoid having trees and bushes within 10 feet of the house, because they tend to absorb water and dry up the soil. It also prevents roots from cracking the foundation walls.
- Install gutters and downspouts so water is deposited well away from the house. Soil around the foundation also needs to be sloped away from the house.
- Compact the soil around the foundation. "The compaction of the backfill is key," said Troy Mardesen, vice president of Denver-based Mardesen Construction Services.
